



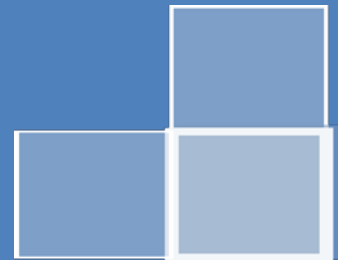

FOREWORD

The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy (KPJA) was established in 2012 vide the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy Act No. IV of 2012. Section 15 of the Act requires that within two months of the conclusion of each calendar year, the Director General shall submit the '*Annual Report*' to the Board of Governors (BoG) in respect of various activities carried out by the Academy during the previous year. The report, however, did not see light of the day within the statutory period. The Director General concerned also left the Academy on March 19, 2020 on expiry of his service contract. Now, on April 21, 2020, the Research & Publication Wing of the Academy blessed me with the honor of inscribing the '*FOREWORD*' of the report.

Transparency is one of the major components of good governance. The periodical reporting of performance of public sector organizations and institutions is considered a step towards transparency. The Academy being a public sector organization presents its performance annually as a statutory responsibility. This report would reveal that how this institution utilizes the resources and whether the efforts of the Academy are in the right direction towards the achievements of the objectives for which this Academy has been established.

The KPJA had indeed a fruitful year. The highlights of the year include the continued capacity building of the justice sector, reflected in an array of trainings imparted by the Academy. During the previous year, i.e. 2019, almost all the targets were achieved in shape of thirty-two trainings/workshops/seminars that include pre-service trainings of civil judges and various other trainings for civil/senior civil judges, additional/ district & sessions judges. The Academy has been able to successfully impart training to Judicial officers of newly merged districts/sessions divisions of the erstwhile FATA in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and newly inducted lawyers across the province. The Academy, in accordance with its aims and objectives also imparted training to court personnel and personnel of other departments connected with the administration of justice, such as public prosecutors, government pleaders, police investigators and many more. .

The participants of all the trainings represented a diverse spectrum associated with the administration of law. They were imparted skills and updated knowledge of the laws. The Academy has also inculcated and developed in them the qualities of a good judge and a good lawyer so that they can face the challenges of day to day judicial work.

Besides, the Academy has been able to make considerable savings. Thus, the Endowment Fund, which started with **fifty (50) million PKR**, has reached **162 million PKR**.

Finally, I would respectfully acknowledge with gratitude the continued support of Mr. Justice Waqar Ahmad Seth, honorable Chief Justice/Chairman, Mr. Justice Qaiser Rashid Khan, honorable Senior Puisne Judge/ Vice Chairman, Dean/Directors, officers and staff of KPJA, in carrying forward the vision and mission of the Academy.

CHAPTER -1 MISSION AND GOVERNANCE

Mission Statement

“Our mission is to develop the constructive attitude of young law-graduates as competent professionals, to build their capacity, to inculcate in them patience, sobriety, confidence, discipline and proficiency of high quality legal reasoning, to enable them to create harmony among all justice sector institutions, to sensitize them to the rights of all litigant public, particularly of the vulnerable communities, and to make them leaders to render positive contribution to strengthen the rule of law.”

Aims & Objectives

Established under the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy Act, (Act No. IV of 2012), the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy aspires to ensure imparting high quality training to judicial officers, courts’ paralegal staff and the personnel of all the departments and institutions who are directly or indirectly associated with the system of administration of justice. The development of curriculum apart, the Academy ensures to transfer knowledge, develop skills and promote progressive attitudes of all the stakeholders of the justice sector. With this purpose, the Academy has set principles of policy to achieve the following prescribed aims and objectives:-

- To train judges, court paralegal staff and personnel concerned with other justice sector institutions and also to develop their capacity, professional competence and ethical standards for efficient dispensation of justice;
- To sensitize judges and all other justice sector personnel about their duty of efficient delivery of justice services to the citizens, notably, the vulnerable communities that will ultimately contribute to the rule of law;
- To develop syllabus for the Academy that suits to its existing and anticipated objectives and to introduce judicial studies as a major subject in view of the emerging requirements in and around Khyber Pakhtunkhwa;
- To develop a think-tank within the Academy – former judges, lawyers, law teachers, progressive religious scholars and civil society -- to promote, support and catalyze justice in strife stricken areas of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa;
- To develop linkages, in-land and abroad, with other academies and institutions;
- To promote debate & dialogue on causes of disputes and to engage with communities at the grassroot level for promotion of justice;
- To raise and generate fund for activities of the Academy;
- To help eliminate delay in adjudication of cases and to make justice truly affordable and expeditious.

2.1 Governance of the Academy

The Khyber Pukhtunkhwa Judicial Academy is a body corporate having perpetual succession and a common seal with power to acquire, hold and dispose of property both moveable and immovable and may, by the said name, sue and be sued. The management of its affairs vests in the Board of Governors (BoG). The Board currently consists of:

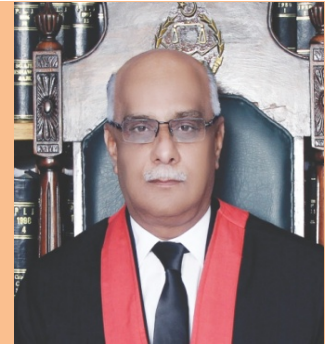
2.2 Role and Powers

The Board of Governors shall:-

- a. exercise supervision and control over the affairs of the Academy;
- b. lay down the policy and program for training;
- c. initiate, modify, adopt the curriculum, courses, modules for orientation and training;
- d. organize and carry out the activities and performance of the authority;
- e. consider and approve the annual budget and revised budget estimate of the academy;
- f. manage financial affairs;
- g. cause proper books of account to be maintained for all sums of money received and expenditure incurred by the academy and arrange for audit of accounts;
- h. specify qualifications, conditions of service and matters relating to the director general, faculty members and staff of the academy;
- i. create, abolish, suspend and upgrade posts;
- j. purchase, hire, construct or alter any building for the use of the academy;
- k. acquire, hold, control, maintain, administer, construct or dispose of any property, or other assets;
- l. acquire, maintain and dispose of any vehicle;
- m. affiliate the academy with other academies, institutions and centers of the federal, provincial or foreign government and organizations;
- n. appoint advisors, consultants and experts and specify their terms and conditions;
- o. appoint or hire permanent or visiting faculty and specify their terms and conditions;

- p. decide any other matter ancillary or incidental to aims and objectives of the academy.

2.5 The Director General

Powers and functions

1. The Director General is appointed by the Chairman on such terms and conditions as may be approved by the Board.
 - a. The Director General shall manage the affairs of the Academy under the general directions of the Chairman;
 - b. The Director General is the academic and administrative head. He is also the Principal Accounting Officer of the Academy.
 - c. The Director General is the DDO of the Academy.
 - d. The Director General shall execute the policy, set out by the BoG:

2.6 Appointment of Officers and Members of Staff of the Academy

1. The members of the staff of the Academy are appointed by direct recruitment, transfer and deputation in such manner and on such terms and conditions as envisaged in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy Staff (Terms & Conditions of Service) Rules, 2012.
2. Appointments of the members of the staff to posts in Basic Pay Scale 17 and above are made by the Chairman.
3. All appointments of the members of the staff to posts in Basic Pay Scale 1 to 16 are made by the Director General with the approval of the Chairman.

2.7 9th Meeting of the Board of Governors

The 9th meeting of the Board of Governors was held on April 22, 2019 at 03:00 pm in the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy. The meeting commenced with the recitation of Holy Quran. The Director General/Secretary welcomed the members. The circulated agenda items were placed before the meeting in order.



9th Meeting of the Board of Governors

Agenda of the Meeting

Decisions

1. All the 29 activities, having taken place in the Academy in year 2018, with their financial details, were approved.
2. The Board decided that by justifying the request for 150 kanals of land, the matter should be taken up with the Provincial Government to re-consider.
3. The Board decided that the Academy should take up the matter with Provincial Government through Planning & Development Department.
4. The Board decided that the Academy should approach the Federal Government for arranging meeting for the said grant.
5. The Board found that this item was settled in the meeting of Finance Committee held on 28.03.2019 and approved the decision of Finance Committee for creation of 28 posts as staff of the Academy' hostel.
6. The Board decided that the reminder should be pursued with Higher Education Commission and the outcome should be placed before the next meeting of the Board.
7. The Board approved the practice adopted by the committee for hiring the private residential accommodation for trainees. The Board, however, decided that in future preferably Government accommodation should be utilized for providing residential accommodation to the trainees. And in case Government accommodation is not available the tender based bidding procedure should be followed.
8. In respect of the review and amendments in the Academy' rules, the Board:-
 - A. deferred the matter of Pensionary benefits and GP Fund for the employees of the Academy and directed that the same be placed before next BOG meeting.
 - B. dropped the matter of Enhancement of the Financial Powers of DG, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy for the time being.
 - C. approved the amendment in the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy Act for provision of Endowment Fund. Secretary, Law Department apprised the Board

that the Cabinet had approved the desired amendments on 15.04.2019 and the same were to be shortly placed before the Provincial Assembly; and

- D.** In respect of Para-D, Hon'ble the Chairman opined that Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy Staff (Terms & Conditions of Service) Rules, 2012 were defective and needed proper revision.
9. The Board approved the recommendations/minutes of the meeting of Finance Committee for the Financial Year 2019-20.
 10. The Board approved the action of Hon'ble the Chairman regarding the investment of the Endowment Fund in the Bank of Khyber. However, the Secretary, Finance proposed that the Academy should approach the Fund Cell, Khyber Pukhtunkhwa Finance Department for exploring other secured investment avenues for the investment of the Fund at higher rates.
 11. The Board approved the appointment of Director General with the term of one year extendable to further one year.

3.2 Interactive Session on Proposed Civil Law Reforms

The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy hosted a day long interactive session on proposed Civil Law Reforms on January 10, 2019. The draft was presented by Director Regulations. It included proposed amendments in the Court Fee Act, and different provisions of the Civil Procedure Code. The session consisted of interactive discussion which was moderated by Mr. Anjad Zia Siddiquee, Director Regulations, Peshawar High Court.



3.3 Training Course for Newly Inducted Lawyers from AJ&K, Balochistan, Gilgit-Baltistan etc.

Two-weeks training course for Newly Inducted Lawyers from Azad Jammu Kashmir, Balochistan, Gilgit-Baltistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa was arranged at the Academy. Twenty-five lawyers from Azad Kashmir, Balochistan, Gilgit-Baltistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa participated in the course. The activity course was tailored to the needs of young lawyers to perform efficiently. The training was unprecedented, where lawyers



from almost across the country participated. Focus of the contents was mainly on areas of ‘Law Giving Verses of the Holy Quran & Sunnah, application of IT in courts, legal & professional ethics, orientation on land acquisition laws, family laws, custody of minors, land laws, art of examination of witnesses, appreciation of evidence, precedents, pleadings, role of lawyers in ADR. Focus was kept on criminal case management, criminal pre-trial proceedings, bail & *superdari*, law of injunctions, framing of Charge, appreciation of electronic evidence. The discourses also included orientation on Juvenile Justice System Act, 2018, Qisas & Diyat laws and practical approach towards framing of Issues, writ jurisdiction, appeal and revision. The activities also included a visit to Forensic Science Laboratory and Khyber Medical College, Peshawar. The participants evaluated the training as effective and beneficial.

3.4 Training for Judicial Officers of Newly Merged Districts

Regular courts in the newly merged districts started working for the first time in the country's history. Peshawar High Court notified the judges' appointment and directed the Judicial Academy to immediately formulate a training plan. The training

was scheduled from 4th to 7th March, 2019; specifically a three-day training session and an immersive one-day session to sort out the possible future modalities. The training course and workshop focused on challenges of judiciary in these areas and solution thereof. The deliberations revolved around these aspects: Frontier Crime Regulations regime and causes of its failure, implementation of legal system in these areas, socio-cultural peculiarities of the Newly Merged Districts (Erstwhile FATA), political dynamics of this region, constitutional and legal implications of the 25th Constitutional Amendment.



Taking into account the region's unique past, the emphasis was put on the area's socio-cultural peculiarities and political dynamics. Renowned journalists Mr. Rahim-ullah Yousafzai and Mr. Saleem Safi shared their experiences. Eventually, during the interactive session, all stakeholders of the justice system joined heads to address the potential challenges and methods for effective delivery.

3.5 Multi-stakeholders Session on 'Child Protection & Juvenile Justice in KP'

The scope of the training, inter alia, was rights of a child under three legal areas: i) international law comprising principles, conventions and agreements, ratified by Government of Pakistan; ii) domestic special legislation on rights of child i.e. Juvenile Justice System, Child Protection and Welfare Act, 2010 etc; and iii) provisions relating to child rights in the general law i.e. Pakistan Penal Code 1860, Code of Criminal Procedure 1898, Qanoon-e-Shahadat Order 1984 and statute on probation laws etc as in force in Pakistan.



The discourses focused to train judicial officers, prosecutors and investigators, who would be engaged in the new system of juvenile and child protection in criminal cases involving children with the objective that they perform their functions in accordance with Pakistan's international obligations, domestic law, and international and regional best practices. The course was divided into three major sections: first, legal framework; second, victim-centric investigations; and third, standard operating procedures. The content covered two general categories of cases: cases involving children in conflict with the law i.e. children accused of



committing crimes, and cases involving children as victims and witnesses of crime, particularly child sexual abuse. It included readings and reference materials, practical exercises, case studies, and links to outside resources and additional reading.

The entire activity revolved around 'rights of child' in the light of these three regimes. There were extensive discussions concerning implementation issues being faced by Courts, prosecutors and other allied agencies. They further made efforts to find out innovative solutions thereof. Training course, it was consensus amongst participants, paved for them a road map as to how to implement the legal system on rights of child in letter and spirit. Questions and answers session of "Each Session" was highly meaningful and productive.

3.6 Pre-Service Training Course for Newly-Appointed AD&SJs of Punjab

Hon'ble Lahore High Court, Lahore and Punjab Judicial Academy, Lahore reposed confidence in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy by sending their eight Additional District Judges for training. The Academy arranged one-week special training course on 25th to 30 March, 2019. The Academy invited experts to share their expertise, knowledge and experience with the participants. The dignitaries included Mr. Abdullah, former Chief Secretary; Mr. Riaz Ahmad, former CJ,

FSC; Mr. Abdul Latif, former Judge High Court; Syed Yahya Zahid Gilani, Sessions Judge (Rtd); Mr. Abdul Matin Khan, Sessions Judge (Rtd); Mr. Muhammad Basir, Director General, KPJA, Mr. Muhammad Zeb, Sessions Judge, Dr. Shakeel Azam Awan, Dean Faculty, KPJA. The topics selected for interaction of resource persons with participants were included:



i) Stress & Time Management; ii) Alternate Dispute Resolution (ADR); iii) Stare Decisis (Doctrine of precedents); iv) Case Management-Civil; v) Order-Sheet Writing-Civil; vi) Criminal Appeals, Revisions, Reference and concept of review; vii) Order-Sheet Writing-Criminal; viii) Judgment Writing-Criminal; ix) Judgment Writing-Civil; x) Judicial Conduct & Ethical Values; xi) Overview of Land Acquisition Act; xii) Rights of Child under the Constitution of Pakistan; xiii) Bonded Labour & Domestic Violence; and xiv) Hard Time in Courts.

3.7 Training for Prison Officers of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy also organized one-day training for Prison Officers on 30th April, 2019. The object of this training was to bring all stakeholders of justice system on single platform, viz Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy. Mr. Muhammad Zeb, (D&SJ) delivered an interactive discourse on "Overview



of Prison law". A detailed briefing on "Prison Problems & Reforms" was delivered by Mr. Khalid Abbas, AIG (Prisons). Another interactive session addressed "Prison Problems & Reforms focusing upon Cr.J.C.C, Prison' visits, Parole, Medical Facilities and Legal Aid etc. the activity was moderated by Mr. Ahmed Ifikhar, Director Instructions. The trainees took very special interest in interacting with the resource person. The activity was graded as beneficial and useful by the participants.

3.8 Trainings of Young Lawyers of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa

Lawyers are professionally required to provide legal counseling to people by helping them understand and navigate the legal system. Owing to the nature of their work, lawyers should be well-equipped in legal knowledge and a better understanding of the court procedures. Attesting its commitment to enhance practitioners' skills, the Academy conducted five training sessions in 2019, wherein newly inducted lawyers from across Khyber Pakhtunkhwa took part.

The Academy focused on the young lawyers having two to four years standing at the Bar. The participants, seventy-five in total, were imparted trainings in the areas of ICTs in relation to court proceedings, forensic science and its significance in relation to justice through science. The participants were imparted discourse on reports of FSL in court proceedings, concept of advocacy in socio-economic perspective, consumer laws. Mr. Naveed Ahmad Khan, District & Sessions Judge delivered lecture on lands laws with special reference to settlement, preparation of jamabandi (periodical record-of-rights) and its role in administration of justice. The discourse was focused on encroachment, demarcation and partition of agricultural land and jurisdictional aspects of civil courts and revenue officers. A detailed talk on "Common Errors & Mistakes in Pleadings" by referring to Order VI, VII & VIII of Civil Procedure Code 1908 and relevant case law on the subject. In the lecture on 'Alternate Dispute Resolution' (ADR), Barrister Mr. Faisal Khan Toru dilated upon figuring out a functional and workable model of ADR System to deal with litigation through informal justice system. Mr. Justice (Rtd.) Abdul Latif delivered lecture on "Orientation of Land Acquisition Law". He highlighted various provisions of Land Acquisition Act 1894 in the light of jurisprudence developed through precedents. The participants were enlightened with concept of acquisition of land, highlighting the difference between market value and the compensation.

The participants were also trained on the subjects of 'bail and superdari', interpretation of statutes, criminal case management, modes of proof in Islamic Jurisprudence, appreciation of electronic evidence, and art of cross-examination', appeals and revisions. The

resource persons referred to the latest case laws and practical aspects of the subjects. The trainings also included an extensive talk on recent amendments in the Civil Procedure Code relating to case management. The participants were also trained on theoretical and practical aspect of Juvenile Justice System Act 2018. They were apprised of rationale of introducing the system and its impact in post-2018 scenario. In the lectures, the participants were engaged in academic activities through group discussions on various important topics e.g. Bar & Bench Liaison, delay in trials, and conduct of a lawyer in court.

3.9 Workshop on ‘Working of Courts in Newly Merged Districts: Challenges and Solutions’

In compliance of the directions of worthy Peshawar High Court, the Academy held a two-day workshop on 02-03 July, 2019 focusing on working of courts established in Newly Merged Districts of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa with a view to ascertain the challenges being faced by them in order to find out practicable solutions.



The first day focused on interaction with judges to diagnose the problems being faced by them in relation to legal, legal-cum-administrative and purely administrative matters. The workshop, after sorting out legal issues, proceeded to resolve the same. The legal-cum-administrative and purely administrative issues formulated on the first day were placed before the officers of Government and officers of JAG branch in the second day activity for the purpose of resolving them. The activities comprised of interactive discourses on three fold components, legal issues, legal-cum-administrative issues and purely administrative issues. The second day envisaged interactive discourse with the officers of the Government, based on the issues identified in the first day of the workshop.

3.10 Training Course on Legislative Drafting

Capacity building in every field of judicial activity is a *sine qua non* for streamlining the system in its entirety. With this objective in view, the Academy arranged five-days training on legislative drafting. Participants of the training were judges, district attorneys, public prosecutors and officers from the Provincial Secretariat on 27th July to 03 August. Experienced resource persons who included the experienced legislative draftsmen were invited. They enlightened the participants with their exceptional expertise and gave their insight on different subjects. The participants were trained on general rules of legislative drafting, role of draftsman in the law-making process, drafting of sub-ordinate legislation and vetting of notifications. The quality of training and its efficacy was gauged from the post-training assessment and resource person’s evaluation by the participants. They expressed satisfaction about the training and its useful practical utility.



3.11 Pre-Service Training of Civil Judges-cum-Judicial Magistrates: August, 2019

Five-week training for forty-two newly inducted civil judges was arranged from 23 July-31 Aug 2019. The training modules were based on the key concepts of knowledge, skills, and attitude. The schedule contained lectures on all the significant areas of civil and criminal law including, precedents, land laws, court fee, and suit valuation, framing issues, framing charge, the law of evidence, criminal pre-trial proceedings, criminal trial, preventive jurisdiction of magistrate, Juvenile Justice System Act, private complaints, rent laws, family laws, High Court Rules and Orders and maintenance of record. Theoretical and practical perspectives on the topics were uniformly blended; a first fortnight of the training emphasizing on theory, and the second containing practical exercises. Besides, the participants were imparted the skills of the case and court management. Finally, judicial conduct and ethical issues also remained in the focus. Worthy Registrar, Peshawar High court delivered a lecture on judicial conduct and Member Inspection Team, Peshawar High Court on 'Judicial Accountability'.



A significant component of the training was the visits to National Institute of Management, Punjab Forensic Science Laboratory, and International Islamic University. The visits had benefits for the participants in acquiring experiential learning, real-world experience, learning styles, and cultural insight. The participants, in their post-training evaluations, rated the training as excellent.

3.12 Trainings on Child Protection Laws: August-Sept, 2019

The Child Courts are established with exclusive jurisdiction in relation to rights of child and enforcement thereof. These courts shall deal with child protection and welfare cases particularly legal custody of destitute and neglected children, reunification of destitute and neglected children with their families, trial of cases registered under the Child Protection and Welfare Act, 2010 welfare of children, trial of cases involving where children are victim, witness and offender and protection of movable and immovable properties of orphans, neglected and children at risk. In order to equip the stakeholders with the laws relating to child protection, the Academy organized two training sessions. These training courses focused on the sensitivity of rights of child in



our social milieu. The participants included judicial officers, prosecutors and investigators.

Outcomes

The participants were sensitized to apply domestic laws and international standards when dealing with a child. They were trained to utilize and implement best practices for victim-centric investigations into their offices and measures to make these spaces more child-friendly. They shall carry out the best practices, learnt during the training, in police cases, arrests, trial proceedings and the investigation overall. The participants shall demonstrate increased sensitivity to and comprehension of how to deal with victims of child sexual abuse, and the measures/methods that need to be and should be taken in a case of child sexual abuse. The participants shall understand and can demonstrate how to manage cases of child perpetrators and children in conflict with the law from the stage of the initial arrest to the final trial proceedings and conclusion of the case plus the investigation. They are expected to implement standard operating procedures (SOPs) for cases involving children particularly cases on child sexual abuse, and children in conflict with the law.

Learning Objectives:

- To identify the primary provisions of domestic and international standards protecting children's rights.
- Understand how, according to International standards, to legally define a child and what constitutes a person being a child.
- Comprehend and be able to use victim-centric best practices for child sexual abuse and children in conflict with law victims and cases.
- Understand what practices are better for which case and how overall courts and police station can be more child friendly.
- Know and be able to put into practice standard operating procedures for cases of Child Sexual Abuse, Child Abuse, and Children in conflict with law.
- Understand the different, varied and special needs of children both psychologically and physically.

3.13 Pre-Service Training Course for Ministerial Establishment of Peshawar High Court Peshawar

Ensuing to the commitment of strengthening the courts' automation systems, Peshawar High Court (PHC) has developed an IT system called Case Flow Management Information System (CFMIS) to better handle and track incoming caseload and backlog cases. The CFMIS includes a complete case management system where every step of the case can be monitored to ensure prompt delivery of justice. It effectively tracks the status of cases, monitors the case processes and supports the collection of reports, which ultimately contributes to the system efficacy and monitoring.

Under the direction of Peshawar High Court, the CFMIS software was installed in four districts i.e. Abbottabad, Mansehra, Torghar, and Swat. There were challenges encountered in the implementation of the software. With the objective in mind, a two-day workshop was organized by Peshawar High Court and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy (KPJA) with the financial



support from the Justice System Support Program (JSSP). The judicial officers and paralegal staff of districts Abbottabad, Mansehra, Torghar, and Swat districts participated.

The workshop was designed with a participatory approach. Participants shared their experiences in fieldwork on the CFMIS and suggested various implementation strategies of the software. They also highlighted operational issues/challenges in the system. The workshop successfully achieved its goal as a whole.

Way Forward

1. IT establishment of Peshawar High Court and District Judiciary Secretariat are to weigh the workshop's recommendations and appropriately update the software where needed.
2. A robust IT regime will be needed at the district level fully equipped with human resources and infrastructure.
3. Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy is to conduct training sessions and workshops pertinent to the automation of courts in general and the software implementation in particular.

3.14 Training for District Officers, Directorate of Industries & Commerce on Consumer Laws

Considering the request of Directorate of Industries & Commerce, the Academy arranged Five-day training on 'Consumer Laws' for the District Officers on 25th to 29th November, 2019. District Officers of Industries and Commerce attended the training. The participants were trained about the updated consumer laws. The participants, in their training evaluations, expressed satisfaction regarding the effectiveness and usefulness of the training.



Objectives of the Workshop

- To streamline the challenges in CFMIS implementation to achieve its real goal;
- To discuss the existing status of CFMIS implementation in District Judiciary;
- Finalization of CFMIS categories by Group work recommendations;
- Finalization of Case Proceedings Flows and Stages in CFMIS by Group work recommendations;
- Finalization of a user interface, reporting modules by Group work recommendations;
- CFMIS implementation in districts by group recommendations.

CHAPTER -4 RESEARCH WING

4.1 LoA between Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy and UNDP

Besides providing judicial education, one of the aims and objectives of the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy is to conduct research in the field of law and judicial studies. To achieve its objectives, the Academy has signed Letter of Agreement (LoA) with United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) to undertake the following research activities/consultancies.

4.2 National Conference on 'Draft Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Criminal Courts (Function) Rules, 2019'

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy arranged a seminar on draft criminal procedure rules. It was held on 18-19 September, 2019 in collaboration with the UNDP. The participants included all the stakeholders of the justice sector, i.e. judicial officers, police officials and prosecutors. The conference was intended to deliberate on the draft, with the aim to bring consistency and improvement in the working of criminal courts. Keeping in view the issues in criminal proceedings and under the guiding principles laid down by august Supreme Court of Pakistan in various judgments, Research Wing of the Academy started working on the issue and its implementable solutions. The first draft of "The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Criminal Courts (Case Management) Rules, 2019 were earlier sent to Hon'ble High Court for consideration. Mr Amjid Zia Siddique, Director (R&P) presented the draft rules. After thorough deliberations, the participants formulated the recommendations.



4.3 Seminar on Legislative Developments and Way-forward in Newly-merged Districts (Erstwhile FATA)

On 17 September 2019, a seminar on KPK's Newly Merged Districts was held. It was intended to strengthen the rule of law in the area by engaging all justice sector stakeholders. Participants included judges, media personnel, police officers, prosecutors, probation and reclamation officers, and lawyers from the newly merged districts. Mr. Muhammad Zeb Khan, District & Sessions Judge gave a presentation as a focal person for the judiciary. He reviewed and applauded the role of the August Superior Courts in upholding the rule of law in the region ever since Pakistan's creation. Saleem Safi, Senior Journalist spoke on the media role in the region. On behalf of the government, Mansoor Qaiser, Additional Secretary Home Department Khyber Pakhtunkhwa delivered a presentation. He explained the creation of new posts, the budget allocation for the new infrastructure and settlement of land records in the region through the use of modern technology.



The presentations were followed by the group discussion and future recommendations. The seminar was a monumental success in highlighting the area's issues followed by swift follow-up by the judiciary, police and media views on the overall situation. The seminar was sponsored by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).

4.4 Syndicate on Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) on Working of Human Rights Cell, Peshawar High Court, Peshawar

The Human Rights Cell (HRC) was established and its operation was regulated by SOPs issued on 14th December, 2006 by the then Hon'able the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Pakistan. At Peshawar High Court, the HRC was established on 2009 and the independent cell was constituted in 2012. Under strengthening the "Rule of Law programme", UNDP is assisting KPJA. In the LOA, signed with the UNDP, one of the activities was analysis of Rules of Business of Human Rights Cell of Peshawar High Court to propose amendments in mechanism to improve referral, redressal, and coordination. The activity was carried out through a consultant, who drafted SoPs. Technical Working Group (TWG) approved the same.



The SOPs contained directions regarding processing of the complaints. Such SOPs intend to provide consistency and harmony with fundamental norms. By the time, the functioning of the Cell has expanded and the need to assess review and analyze of its working became inevitable. The activity was focused on analysis of Rules of Business of Human Rights Cell of Peshawar High Court and to propose amendments to improve its referral, redressal and co-ordination mechanism. The activity was carried out through a consultant, who had drafted the Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs). Technical Working Group (TWG) approved the SOPs. The syndicate was attended by Mr. Muhammad Bashir, Director General, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy (KPJA), Mr. Ashfaq Taj, Senior Director Administration, Mr. Ahmed Iftikhar, Director Instruction-II (KPJA), Mr. Zaeem Ahmed, Director (HR), SDJ, PHC, Syeda Tehreema Sabahat, Assistant Draftsperson, PHC, Mr. Ijaz, Focal person for Courts, UNDP, Mr. Humayun Babar, Deputy Director and Mr. Taimur Azam, Assistant Academics (KPJA).

Objectives of the Human Rights' Cell

- *To ensure expeditious and inexpensive dispensation of justice in response to all the calls of the public at large in the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa;*
- *No complaint should go unheard;*
- *Everyone in the province should have the unflinching sense of ownership of the Peshawar High Court as an institution committed to serve them in furtherance of their rights;*
- *Grievances should be redressed in a manner involving zero expenditure for*
- *To institutionalize an effective response to the communications of the people relating to infringements of their fundamental rights.*

4.5 Rewaj-e-Pukhtun: The Customary Rules of Dispute Resolution in FATA

In pursuant to the objective to assess the factual and ground-realities of the Newly Merged Districts and assessment of implementation of the justice system, the Academy conducted a research study about the customary practices of dispute resolution in vogue in the erstwhile FATA areas. Mr. Ahmed Iftikhar, Director Research and Publication prepared an exhaustive report about the customary practices regarding jirga procedure, adjudication of crime and civil customary rules. The report is available on official website of the Academy.

4.6 One-day Focus Group Discussion (FGD) on the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908 (V of 1098) (Amendment) Act, 2019

An extensive discourse, addressing the possible legal implications of the proposed amendments in Code of Civil Procedure, was arranged by the Academy. It was focused on incompatibility of the amendments with fundamental rights, norms of justice and procedural jurisprudence. The discourse touched upon the provisions for spot checks, commission for recording



evidence, Two-tier system of trial courts, practical implications and legal effects, conversion of Courts of Appeal into trial courts for civil causes, pecuniary limits and impact thereof on litigation, legal impact of the amendment concerning courts of appeal, effects of the change in language of section 115 of the Code, and incompatibility of the amendments with fundamental Rights, norms of justice and procedural jurisprudence. Ensuing to the detailed deliberation, the house pronounced its recommendations. Considering the serious legal implication of the amendments, it was concluded that a national level seminar should be arranged on the issue.

The FGD was focused on incompatibility of the amendments with fundamental rights, norms of justice and procedural jurisprudence.

4.7 Letter of Understanding (LoU) between KPJA and Shariah Academy, IIUI, Islamabad

Dr. Shakeel Azam Awan, Dean Faculty, KPJA and Dr. Muhammad Mushtaq Ahmad, Director General, Shariah Academy, Islamic International University, Islamabad signed LoU on 29th October, 2019 at IIUI, Islamabad for, inter alia, purposes of promoting academic learning, policy-oriented research, capacity building and training of the Judicial Officers and Faculty of the University and other stakeholders of the justice sector system. It will help boost the quality of legal education and training being imparted to the stakeholders of justice sector system at the Academy. It will further help the Judicial Officers for improving their educational qualifications by a quota being reserved for the nominees of the Academy in LL.M programmes offered by the Law Department, Islamic International University, Islamabad. The University may also be offering specialized courses through distance-learning programmes.



CHAPTER -5 INFORMATION & COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY

5.1 IT Facilities & its Utilization in the Academy

The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy is equipped with state-of-the-art Information Technology (IT) infrastructure. All the offices, class rooms, auditorium and computer lab are connected with local area network (LAN). Wi-Fi facility is also available in the Academy to facilitate the trainee participants and it provides open access to all. The Academy has its official website which is regularly maintained, updated and improved through the official web developer of the Academy. The catalogue of the library is automated and its software is indigenously programmed at the Academy. This catalogue is uploaded to the website and is accessible to the general public. Similarly, an asset tracking system has also been designed and programmed by the Academy's programmer. It keeps track of all movable assets of the Academy and it is updated through barcode readers. The IT wing has also developed a prototype of training database called the activity management system (AMS) with separate module meant for evaluation. It regularly updates the training profiles of both trainers and trainees. This system works on online evaluation through randomly sorted multiple choice questions. Through this module, both the trainees and the trainers can be objectively evaluated. The IT wing has also designed a payroll software, which is operative at the elementary level.

In pursuance of the decision taken in the second meeting of the IT and Media Committee, follow up was made as under:

Mr. Zulfiqar Khan and Mr. Arman Khan participated in the training program on editing of the video of lectures. DVR was purchased for connectivity to PolyCom device and storage of the recorded data. Development of e-office for the Academy was under progress. Ensuing the actions taken, video lectures were processed and made ready for the uploading on the official website of the Academy.

5.2 Library, Collection Development and Enhancement

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy has a state-of-the-art library. The library catalogue is enriched with 3500 books, periodicals, journals, research studies and other reading materials. The reading room and collections are available to the faculty members, participants of training courses and employees of the Academy, researchers, among others, during regular library hours. Library staff is at service of the participants/learners. The library has access to Digital Library of HEC, PLD law-site and PLJ journals. Fifty (50) general links are also available on the Academy's website, and through such sources more than 5000 books can be accessed. In the year 2019, some new subscription and purchases were also made.

CHAPTER -6 RADIO MEEZAN FM 96.6

The role of media in information sharing is growing spectacularly with recognition of the right to information and fundamental rights enshrined in the Constitution of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan, 1973. Among the mass media in recent time, role of FM radio is undeniable. The FM radio provides easy, inexpensive and frequent accessibility to the media, which raises the level of public expectations. The public has right to know about such information from key public sector institutions, which has an impact on their lives. As a non-commercial non-political facility, Radio Meezan operates under the PEMRA Rules. The transmission frequency allotted to the Radio is FM 96.6. The coverage of the Radio is presently extended to district Peshawar and the adjacent areas. It shall be extended to the whole province of Khyber Pukhtunkhwa in due course of time.

6.1 Programs Format

News Bulletins

Radio Meezan broadcasts news bulletins in Pashto and Urdu. Each bulletin consists of 10 minutes duration.

News reports

It consists of the news about courts proceedings, human rights issues, functions of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy, International days e.g. Labor Day, Women Day, TB day and others.

News Packages

The news packages include law and courts related stories, seminars, workshops, trainings, visits, inaugurations and reports of the academic activities of the Academy.

Discussion/ Lecture Forum

At various discussion forums, lectures are delivered by renowned lawyers, jurists and constitutional experts on law related topics.

Live Presentations

Interacting with audience on law related issues, phone lines are open during such programs, where audience can not only give their input but can also seek legal advice of the legal expert on the subject.

- Awareness among citizens about fundamental human rights.
- Awareness among citizens about their rights and responsibilities in the existing system of law.
- Awareness about rights of children, and minorities, women and weaker segments of society.
- Encouraging access to Human Rights Directorate of the Peshawar High Court.
- Public forum to seek legal advice on solution of disputes.
- Acquainting citizens with the laws, rules and regulations of the country.
- Educate and interpret public about the country's legal system in light of views of renowned legal and judicial experts.

7.2 Additional Accounts

- In pursuance of recommendations inked by the Finance Committee of the Academy held on 28.03.2019 and after approval by the Board of Governors of the Academy in the 9th meeting held on 22.04.2019, Finance Department, Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa agreed to release funds amounting **Rs. 121.000 million** as **grant-in-aid** for the current financial year 2019-20.
- During 2019, a sum of **Rs. 5,765,702/-** was earned from trainings, workshops and seminars. After approval of Hon'ble the Chief Justice, PHC/Chairman, the earning along with some of the balance of **Rs. 6,600,000/-** was transferred to Endowment Fund in March, 2020 for strengthening the same.
- A profit of **Rs. 20,736,000/-** is expected from the investment made by the Academy towards Endowment Fund kept in Bank of Khyber, PHC Branch, Peshawar.

7.3 Development Sector

- A sum of **Rs 15.000 million** has been released in two tranches i.e. **Rs 3.750 million** and **Rs 11.250 million** to Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy under revenue component in the development sector under DDO Code PR-5768 for purchase of furniture, fixtures and allied equipments for the Academy' Hostel vide August Peshawar High Court letter No. A (a) 25-A (P&D)/Releases-138 dated 27th August, 2019 and letter No. A (a) 25-A (P&D)/Releases-125 dated 25th October, 2019. A nine member committee (Annex-A) has been formed for procurement of articles under the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Public Procurement of Goods, Works and Services Rules, 2014. The Committee is working to accomplish its task before closing of the current financial year.



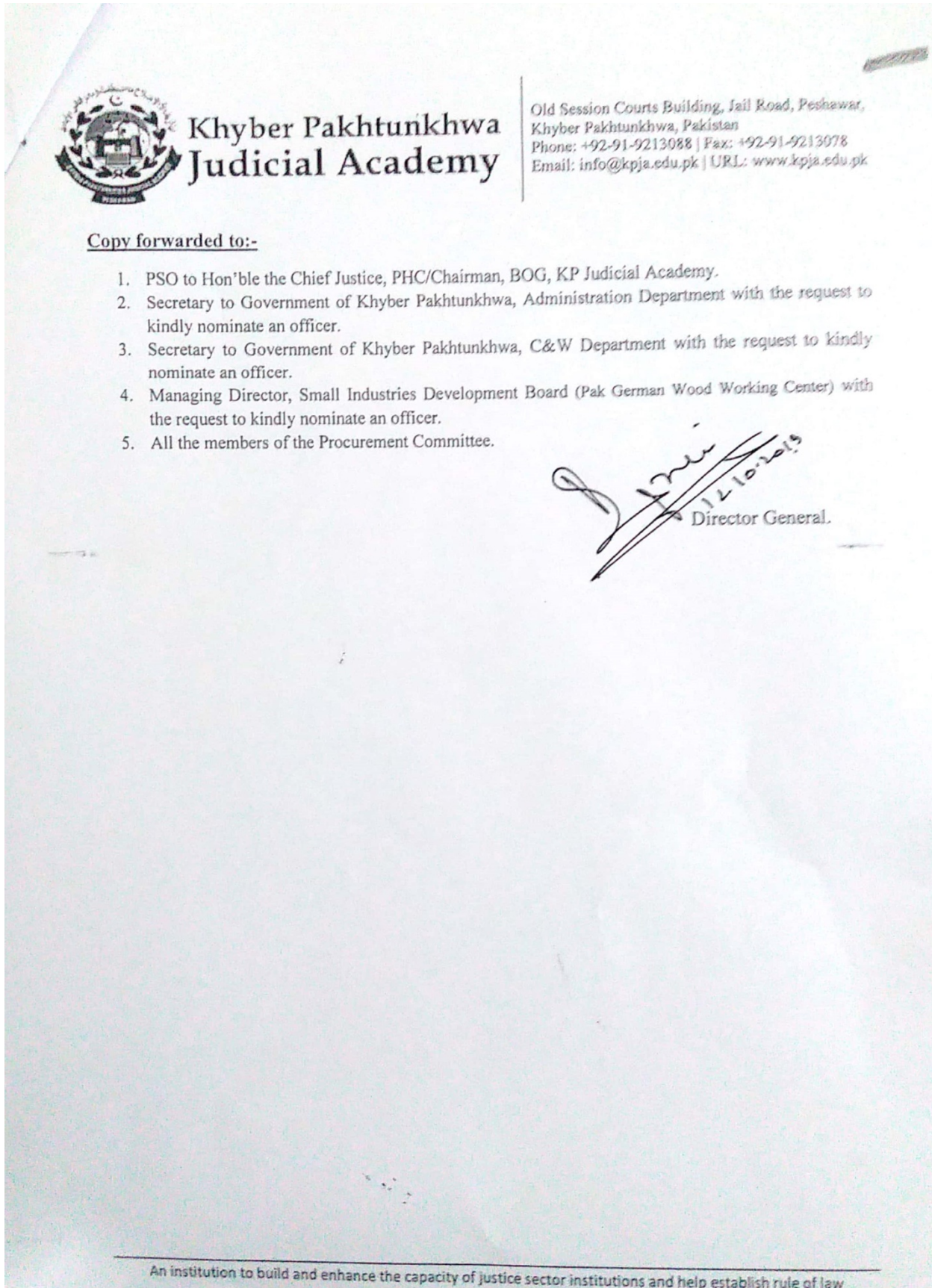
